1	Apologies for Absence		Richard Wilson and Sarah Steele sent apologies for absence which were accepted by the governing body.

3	Co-opt new governors	Siobhan Dickens Fran Hughes	The governing body unanimously agreed the co-option of two new governors – Siobhan Dickens and Fran Hughes, effective from today and they joined the meeting.	
4	Therapy dog (Lucy Coston)		<ul> <li>Lucy Coston attended the meeting to talk with Governors about the introduction of a therapy dog at Queen Emma School.</li> <li>1. A consultation has taken place with parents of Reception pupils as the therapy dog will reside in Owl Class. Responses have largely been incredibly positive although one or two concerns have been raised, which school have responded to. A consultation is now taking place with parents across the school, with parents asked to share their views by Friday 8<sup>th</sup> December.</li> </ul>	

5	Agree minutes of the last	Minutes 16.10.2023	<ol> <li>Lucy Coston, Owl Class teacher and Katie Rowe, our Nurture Group Leader will train as dog handlers. They will follow the mentor dog programme. LC is funding the training herself at a cost of £1350 and school is asking the Governors if they are happy to fund KR, as an additional handler, at a cost of £550. Therapy dogs can only move around school under the supervision of a trained handler. Training for KR will complement her role as nurture group leader and allow her to access multiple classes and groups of children and would mean that the dog can be moved around school by two members of staff, providing flexibility.</li> <li>Challenge: Will staff prepare a risk assessment and are we insured? Yes, we are already preparing a specialised risk assessment for a therapy dog in school and insurance and Public Liability insurance is provided through LC.</li> <li>Challenge: What benefits are there to the children of a therapy dog? Therapy dogs can help with all aspects of life in school; children feel calmer and more able to regulate themselves and concentrate; they can support self-esteem in pupils; during reading time or working times there is evidence that pupils do more work and focus better with the dog there; children become more confident as they have a friend, and also a shared interest with other pupils.</li> <li>Challenge: What concerns have been raised in response to the consultation? We have had concerns raised about allergic reactions and children who are frightened of dogs. Once the consultation has closed on Friday, we will be meeting to discuss all the concerns raised and to address them with parents.</li> <li>Challenge: Have concerns been raised around faith? Some faith groups consider dogs to be unclean? As yet not concerns have been raised about this.</li> <li>Governors were supportive of the introduction of Ozzy, a Labrador puppy, as a therapy dog at Queen Emma School and unanimously agreed that the funding for training (£550) should be provided to support KR. Outcomes for children who are permanently excluded are very poor. We try to work with the local authority to implement reduced time-tables and alternative provision rather than permanent exclusion.</li> <li>Challenge: Does the chill-out room help? Yes, this does offer children an alternative during lunch and break times.</li> <li>Challenge: Our other schools locally facing these challenges? Yes, due to a lack of funding and therefore provision across the county.</li> </ol>

EHT took Sarah on a visit around Queen Emma School and detailed safeguarding procedures.</li> <li>Sarah provided an excellent and detailed report about her visit for which governors thanked her and found very helpful.</li> <li>Joanna MacKenzie, Safeguarding link governor for Queen Edith is visiting both schools to inspect their SCRs later this week and will provide a report for the next meeting in January.</li> <li>Ambili Nair, Science link governor, had hosted Marianna Santocchini and Nicki Simmons at AstraZeneca where they had a tour and also saw the art display that pupils had been involved with. 14	What is the impact of decisions made during this meeting upon the standards and improvement of the Federation?		<ol> <li>Agreed funding for therapy dog handler to support pupils at Queen Emma School.</li> <li>Strategic planning for governor visits in line with whole school monitoring.</li> <li>Executive Headteacher's report provided governors with very detailed information to support their in-depth understanding of both schools, successes and stresses.</li> <li>More detailed understanding of reporting through MyConcern.</li> <li>We are keen that our nurture provision is up and running at both schools from January and Fran Hughes and Ambili Nair are keen to visit to see how this provision will meet the needs of our SEMH pupils during Spring Term A.</li> <li>Craig Dyer is keen to see the Therapy Dog in practice once the consultation with parents is complete and Ozzy has started training and being in school.</li> </ol>	
15	Receive Minutes of Committee Meetings	Standards & Improvement 20.11.2023 Finance & Resources 27.11.2023	<ul> <li>Standards and Improvement 20.11.2023</li> <li>Upper KS2 phase leaders joined the meeting to update the committee on strategies at each school for closing the attainment gap in Years 5 and 6.</li> <li>Improving picture for attendance at both schools compared to the same time last year.</li> <li>Finance and Resources 27.11.2023</li> <li>Committee had been provided with its first BMR since the introduction of SBS. This has really hampered senior staff and governors in their efforts to monitor the budget. The Committee has agreed to write a letter of complaint to the local authority.</li> <li>There has been a 200% overspend on support staff supply budget, particularly at Queen Emma School, largely due to the SEMH needs of children who do not meet threshold for EHCP, but require considerable support to be in school. This has eaten nearly all the carry forward from the last financial year and it is agreed that spending on supply must be cut dramatically.</li> <li>Catering has been taken over by Aspens.</li> </ul>
